The Local Choice /Positive Policy Toolkit is an effective measure to advocate for better election systems and promote constructive election policies by:

- 1) Examining recent changes in methods of election,
- 2) Providing information on alternative election arrangements,
- 3) Analyzing redistricting proposals,
- 4) Encouraging intra-state networking opportunities.

In short, this toolkit encourages an examination of your current election systems, and suggests exploring alternative systems that may enhance fair voting opportunities.

Using the Local Choice/Positive Policy Toolkit

- ⇒ Review answers to toolkit questionnaire
- ⇒ Discuss effects of any recent changes in election policies, submit op-eds, increase awareness
- ⇒ Use toolkit to become familiar with alternative systems, possible litigation efforts, effective communication strategies, and confer with SOLVE & SOLVE organizations that specialize in specific voting rights issues
- ⇒ Use toolkit to promote intrastate networking opportunities and combine resources in states and regions
- ⇒ Meet with community groups, organizers, elected officials, and other voting rights organizations to discuss current election policies and implications for advocating change
- ⇒ Develop a plan
- ⇒ Remain persistent

FAIR REPRESENTATION

All voters should have equal voting power, and, ideally, an equally realistic opportunity to elect their candidates of choice. Most of our elections systems are one, or some combination of the following:

- Single-member District System, where jurisdictions are divided into geographically-defines areas (districts) and voters within that district elect one representative,
- At-large System, candidates are elected from the entire area instead of specific districts, and all voters cast votes for a number of candidates,
- Mixed System, where jurisdictions combine both at-large and single-member district systems.

Those jurisdictions utilizing any form of the single-member district system must examine and redraw districts after every census to ensure equal population under the one-person, one vote principle.

There are other constitutional forms of proportional representation that allow electing representatives roughly in proportion to their share of the vote in an election. Some Fair Representation Voting methods include:

- Ranked choice voting, voters rank candidates in order of their preference,
- Cumulative voting, voters allocate their votes however they wish, often giving one candidate several votes,
- Limited voting, voters cast fewer votes than the number of seats in an election,
- **Districts-plus voting**, preserves current geographically-based system, but ensures that when one party's candidate get the most votes that party will win the most seats.

Home Rule powers granted by constitutional amendment

ELECTION SYSTEM & INFORMATION UPDATES

- Supreme Court remanded state House & Senate plan to lower court for further consideration of a Republican-led measure to pack minorities into districts to lessen their influence (Alabama Legislative Black Caucus v. Alabama)
- Mid-decade redistricting in Daphne, AL
- Reduction in polling places in Daphne, AL
- In 2016, enacted a e-poll book pilot program
- The Greater Birmingham Ministries filed felon voting rights lawsuit; persons convicted of felonies involving "moral turpitude" are not able to vote.

FAIR REPRESENTATION

In the late 1908's, *Dillard v. Crenshaw County* was a mammoth lawsuit that challenged the legality of 180 local Alabama jurisdictions. Ultimately, 30 of 94 Alabama jurisdictions adopted an alternative election system as a remedy for minority vote dilution.

ELECTION SYSTEM & INFORMATION UPDATES

- Between 2012 and 2015, the enacted Congressional and Senate maps were repeatedly challenged in the courts. In December of 2015, the Supreme Court of Florida and the Second Judicial Circuit Court in Leon County ordered new congressional and state senate plans, respectively.
- State's illegally gerrymandered Senate districts replaced by Fair Districts Now proposed map
- E-poll books may be used at precincts


Counties operate under home rule

- E-poll books are used statewide, procedures for their use appear in the Rules and Regulations of the State of Georgia (183-1-12-07)
- Hundreds of thousands of qualified, registered voters removed from voter rolls for exercising their right not to vote (*Common Cause, GA State Conference of the NAACP v. Brian Kemp*)



- LA law that required naturalized citizens to provide proof of U.S. citizenship was repealed
- College student ID cards now allowed for voting as a result of House Bill 940 by Rep. Randal Gaines

Counties exercise most municipal functions

- General Assembly must redraw 28 racially gerrymandered House & Senate districts by March 15, 2017, with special primary and general election in the fall of 2017.
- Reduction in polling places in several NC counties
- E-poll books are permitted in lieu of or in addition to paper poll books (N.C. Gen. Stat. \$163-166.7)
- E-poll books failed in Durham County during 2016 Presidential Election
- Federal court rejected North Carolina's voter suppression efforts



Municipalities are served by their county government

- The state election commission provides procedures, training, and support for e-poll books
- The SC Progressive Network's two year campaign resulted in a victory requiring the Greenville County Board of Registration to permit college students to register to vote and cease and desist requiring additional questionnaires from on-campus residents of Greenville County colleges.
- Statewide confusion over the state's voter education material
- Awaiting information from the state joint legislative commission on "Voting Systems Research" empaneled to review voting systems to replace the 12 year old paperless iVotronics

County governments may adopt home rule charters

- Challenge to Tennessee's Senate plan on grounds that the plan divides more counties than allowed by state constitution (*Moore v. Haslam*)
- Permits the use of e-poll books and provides procedures for their use at polling places (Tenn. Code Ann. \$2-7-112)

TEXAS

Municipalities of 5000 or more may adopt home rule charters

- Federal court maintains method of counting total population in redistricting (Evenwell v. Abbott)
- Supreme Court declined to hear arguments in TX voter ID battle, following lower court ruling that the 2011 law discriminates against minority groups.
- Challenge to state Congressional, House & Senate plans on grounds that the plan dilutes African American and Latino vote (*Perez v. Perry*)
- Allows for the use of an e-poll book with electronic signature capacity (Tex. Election Code Ann. \$63.002)
- Federal court ruled that City of Pasadena, TX violated Section 2 of the VRA, and also purposely intended to discriminate against Latino voters by changing an eight single-member district system to a hybrid system that replaced 2 neighborhood districts with at-large seats.

Municipal governments in Virginia are city & town governments

- Court struck down original congressional district lines that packed African American voters into lone African American lawmaker, Rep. Bobby Scott's district (District 3) [Wittman v. Personhuballah]
- VA restores voting rights to formerly incarcerated persons
- Provides procedures for the use of e-poll books and specifies that localities may purchase e-poll books that have been approved by the State Board of Elections. (Va. Code \$24.2-611, \$24.2-668, \$24.2-404 A.7)
